Experience	 The successful candidate will have experience of: At least two years in a leadership and management role within a school environment, demonstrating a sound knowledge of the SEN Code of Practice and its application. Leading, monitoring and reviewing curriculum areas across a key stage. Working effectively with vulnerable pupils. Creating and implementing PEPs for LAC and safeguarding procedures in schools. Liaising with a range of agencies and professionals to support pupils, as well as working closely with the LA. Working effectively with parents to safeguard pupils. Multi-agency liaison for three years. Working with and caring for pupils with SEND. 	Leading or effectively contributing to child protection cases. Working in line with expectations in the Ofsted framework regarding effective learning and teaching.
