Job Title:	Classroom Teacher
Job Location:	Marine Park Primary School
Responsible to:	Headteacher and Board of Trustees- Tyne and Wear Learning Trust

Purpose

As a classroom teacher you will be responsible for designing and implementing engaging lesson plans aligned with curriculum standards, assessing pupil progress, and providing individualised support to meet diverse learning needs. You will be part of a school team, communicate effectively with parents or carers, and contribute to the overall educational ethos and values of the school.

Key Duties and Responsibilities

- Plan, prepare, and deliver engaging and developmentally appropriate learning experiences in line with the EYFS or National Curriculum.
- Create a supportive and nurturing learning environment that fosters children's physical, emotional, social, and cognitive development.
- Use a variety of assessment methods to track progress, inform planning, and report effectively to parents and carers.
- Build strong relationships with pupils, parents, and colleagues to support each child's learning journey.
- Contribute to the wider life of the school, including participation in staff meetings, INSET days, and school events.
- Promote positive behaviour and uphold the school's values and policies.
- Maintain a safe, clean, and stimulating classroom environment, including managing displays and resources effectively.

The appointment of a teacher is subject to the current conditions of employment for teachers contained in:

- The School Teachers' Pay and Conditions Document (STCPD)
- The required Standards for Qualified Teacher status
- Other current and relevant legislation and statutory guidance for teachers

Teachers Role

1. Set High Expectations Which Inspire, Motivate and Challenge Pupils

- Establish a safe and stimulating environment for pupils, rooted in mutual respect.
- Set goals that stretch and challenge pupils of all backgrounds, abilities and dispositions.
- Demonstrate consistently the positive attitudes, values and behaviour which are expected of pupils.

2 Promote Good Progress and Outcomes by Pupils

- Be accountable for pupils' attainment, progress and outcomes.

- Be aware of pupils' capabilities and their prior knowledge, and plan teaching to build on these.
- Guide pupils to reflect on the progress they have made and their emerging needs
- Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of how pupils learn and how these impacts on teaching.
- Encourage pupils to take a responsible and conscientious attitude to their own work and study.

3. Demonstrate Good Subject and Curriculum Knowledge

- Have a secure knowledge of the relevant subject(s) and curriculum areas, foster and maintain pupils' interest in the subject, and address misunderstandings.
- Demonstrate a critical understanding of developments in the subject and curriculum areas, and promote the value of scholarship.
- Demonstrate an understanding of and take responsibility for promoting high standards of literacy, articulacy and the correct use of standard English, whatever the teacher's specialist subject.
- If teaching early reading, demonstrate a clear understanding of systematic synthetic phonics.
- If teaching early mathematics, demonstrate a clear understanding of appropriate teaching strategies.

4 Plan and Teach Well-Structured Lessons

- Impart knowledge and develop understanding through effective use of lesson time.
- Promote a love of learning and children's intellectual curiosity.
- Set homework and plan other out-of-class activities to consolidate and extend the knowledge and understanding pupils have acquired.
- Reflect systematically on the effectiveness of lessons and approaches to teaching
- Contribute to the design and provision of an engaging curriculum within the relevant subject area/s.

5 Adapt Teaching to Respond to the Strengths and Needs of all Pupils

- Know when and how to differentiate appropriately, using approaches which enable pupils to be taught effectively.
- Have a secure understanding of how a range of factors can inhibit pupils' ability to learn, and how best to overcome these.
- Demonstrate an awareness of the physical, social and intellectual development of children, and know how to adapt teaching to support pupils' education at different stages of development.
- Have a clear understanding of the needs of all pupils, including those with special educational needs; those of high ability; those with English as an additional language; those with disabilities; and be able to use and evaluate distinctive teaching approaches to engage and support them.

6 Make Accurate and Productive use of Assessment

- Know and understand how to assess the relevant subject and curriculum areas, including statutory assessment requirements.
- Make use of formative and summative assessment to secure pupils' progress.
- Use relevant data to monitor progress, set targets, and plan subsequent lessons.
- Give pupils regular feedback, both orally and through accurate marking, and encourage pupils to respond to the feedback.

7 Manage Behaviour Effectively to Ensure a Good and Safe Learning Environment

- Have clear rules and routines for behaviour in classrooms, and take responsibility for promoting good and courteous behaviour both in classrooms and around the Academy, in accordance with the Academy's behaviour policy.
- Have high expectations of behaviour, and establish a framework for discipline with a range of strategies, using praise, sanctions and rewards consistently and fairly.
- Manage classes effectively, using approaches which are appropriate to pupils' needs in order to involve and motivate them.
- Maintain good relationships with pupils, exercise appropriate authority, and act decisively when necessary.

8 Fulfil Wider Professional Responsibilities

- Make a positive contribution to the wider life and ethos of the Academy.
- Develop effective professional relationships with colleagues, knowing how and when to draw on advice and specialist support.
- Deploy support staff effectively.
- Take responsibility for improving teaching through appropriate professional development, responding to advice and feedback from colleagues.
- Communicate effectively with parents/carers in regard to pupils' achievements and well-being.
