KEY STAGE 3 GEOGRAPHY

Throughout Key Stage 3 students learn about the physical and human processes that shape landscapes, towns and cities, and affect people's lives.

Places studied vary from the local to the global scale including case studies in the UK, Europe and developing countries. A range of skills is acquired: drawing and interpreting maps, written and oral communication, ICT, graphicacy, fieldwork investigations. Each term's work enables students to answer a key enquiry question.

Each unit of work is assessed, according to National Curriculum criteria, by mini exams that begin to train the students revision and exam techniques which will support them going into their GCSEs. Students are set three one hour homeworks

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per term, 2 of which they choose from the 'pentagon' homework sheet they are

issued with at the start of each term, which they glue into their planners for you to check.

A-Level Geography

Course description

The Geography A Level helps you to explore contemporary geographical issues which hit the news everyday. Issues include the causes and consequences of globalisation on UK society, politics and economy; the impact of global superpowers on conflict and global governance; how to manage increasing risk to global populations from hazards including floods and earthquakes; and the environmental and political consequences of climate change. You will become an informed, critical thinker with an A Level considered a 'facilitating subject" by the Russel group of top universities for the range of technical, analytical and critical skills it teaches.

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Teaching will be through enquiry questions that encourage you to investigate issues, analyse the evidence and make up your own mind about solutions to local and global issues. You will learn in a wide variety of ways such as by using maps, GIS skills, data analysis, photos, videos and fieldwork. You will be encouraged to frame your own questions using higher level thinking skills and showing your grasp of complex issues through report and essay writing. Geography is a broad based subject that fits well in a range of future university courses and careers. For example, it underpins careers in politics and economics; sociology; sustainability and environmental issues; managing the effects of hazards and climate change, and supports careers in business and law through an understanding of global economics.

Paper 3:

- An externally-assessed written examination which draws on knowledge from across the course
- A resource booklet will contain information about the geographical issues including globalisation, superpowers, regeneration, water & carbon.

Written examination: 2 hours and 15 minutes, 20% of the qualification.

Coursework: Independent investigation: 4 days' fieldwork (approx £350)

Students design their own geographic investigation; collect and present their own data and independently analyse and draw conclusions in a written report of 3000–4000 words related to any aspect of geography contained within the specification (steered by the Geography department). The geography department offers introductory field skills days where students learn how to conduct their own investigation and collect and analyse data. Students then complete a 4 day residential fieldwork trip to the Devon coast with the Field Studies Council costing approximately £350.

Non-examined assessment 20% of the qualification.
