Job Purpose

This job description reflects the **National Standards of Excellence for Headteachers (2015)**. These standards are built upon The Teaching Standards (2011) which apply to all teachers, including Headteachers.

In carrying out his/her duties, the Head of School shall consult, where appropriate, with the Executive Headteacher, National Director (Specialist), Academy Council and the staff of the school, its pupils and the parents of its pupils.

The core purpose of the Head of School is to provide professional leadership and management for the school. This will promote a secure foundation from which to achieve high standards in all areas of the school's work. To gain this success the Head of School must establish high quality education by effectively managing teaching and learning and using personalised learning to realise the potential of all pupils. The Head of School should establish a culture that reflects the Trust and school vision and values, promotes excellence, equality and high expectations of all pupils.

Key Responsibilities

Qualities and Knowledge

- Hold and articulate clear values and moral purpose focused on providing a worldclass education for the pupils they serve.
- Demonstrate optimistic personal behaviour, positive relationships and attitudes towards their pupils and staff, and towards parents, Academy Council and members of the local community.
- Lead by example with integrity, creativity, resilience, and clarity drawing on their own scholarship, expertise and skills, and that of those around them.
- Sustain wide, current knowledge and understanding of education and school systems locally, nationally and globally, and pursue continuous professional development.
- Work with political and financial astuteness, within a clear set of principles centred on the school's vision, ably translating local and national policy into the school's context.
- Communicate compellingly the school's vision and drive the strategic leadership, empowering all pupils and staff to excel.

Pupils and Staff

- Demand ambitious standards of achievement and attendance for all pupils, overcoming disadvantage and advancing equality, instilling a strong sense of accountability in staff for the impact of their work on pupils' outcomes.
- Secure excellent teaching through an analytical understanding of how pupils learn and of the core features of successful classroom practice and curriculum design, leading to rich curriculum opportunities and pupils' well-being.
- Establish an educational culture of "open classrooms" as a basis for sharing best practice
 within and between schools, drawing on and conducting relevant research and robust data
 analysis.

- Create an ethos within which all staff are motivated and supported to develop their own skills and subject knowledge, and to support each other.
- Identify emerging talents, coaching current and aspiring leaders in a climate where excellence is the standard, leading to clear succession planning.
- Hold all staff to account for their professional conduct and practice.

Systems and Process

- Ensure that the school's systems, organisation and processes are well considered, efficient
 and fit for purpose, upholding the principles of transparency and integrity with a strong
 moral compass.
- Provide a safe, calm and well-ordered environment for all pupils and staff, focused on safeguarding pupils and developing their exemplary behaviour in school and in the wider society.
- Establish rigorous, fair and transparent systems and measures for managing the performance of all staff, addressing any under-performance, supporting staff to improve and valuing excellent practice.
- Welcome strong governance and actively support the Academy Council to understand its role
 and deliver its functions effectively in particular its functions to assist in supporting and
 challenging school strategy and hold the Headteacher/ Head of School to account for pupil,
 staff and financial performance.
- Exercise strategic, curriculum-led financial planning to ensure the equitable deployment of budgets and resources, in the best interests of pupils' achievements and the school's sustainability.
- Distribute leadership throughout the organisation, forging teams of colleagues who have distinct roles and responsibilities and hold each other to account for their decision making.

The Self-improving School System

- Create an outward-facing school which works with other schools, organisations and the local community— in a climate of mutual challenge – to champion best practice and secure excellent achievements for all pupils.
- Develop effective relationships with fellow professionals, colleagues in other public services, parents/carers to improve academic and social outcomes for all pupils.

 the findings of well evidenced research to frame self-regulating and selfimproving schools.
- Shape the current and future quality of the teaching profession through high quality training and sustained professional development of all staff.
- Model entrepreneurial and innovative approaches to school improvement, leadership and governance, confident of the vital contribution of internal and external accountability.
- Inspire and influence others- within and beyond schools- to believe in the fundamental importance of education in young people's lives and to promote the value of education.
