We are currently offering individual tours of school for Reception children due to the current situation at the time of writing. For anyone else please contact the school and we will try to accommodate you.



TEACHING TIME

Each school has to publish its teaching time.

- Key Stage 1 is taught for 21 hours 40 minutes per week.
- Key Stage 2 is taught for 23 hours 20 minutes per week.

The teaching time does not include registration, assemblies and break times.

HOME DINNERS

Because of Covid requirements children are not encouraged to go home at lunchtime. This will need to be discussed with the Head Teacher on an individual basis, if you wish your child to go home at lunchtime.

Please let us know by 2.30 pm if somebody other than parents will be collecting your child or we will not release your child.


If the person is unknown to staff a password will need to be set up.



ADMISSIONS POLICY



In consultation with the governors the Local Education Authority (LEA) determines the number of pupils that may be admitted to the school each year; this is generally referred to as the school's published admission number (PAN). The PAN for Victoria Community School is 60 for each year group. If the number of applications for admission to a school exceeds the school's planned admission number then the following revised order of priority will be used to allocate the available places:

- Pupils who are looked after children
- 2. EHCP: Children with an education health care plan allocated places.
- 3. Pupils who satisfy **both** of the following tests:

Test 1

They are distinguished from the great majority of other applicants either on medical grounds or by other exceptional circumstances.

Medical grounds must be supported by a medical report (obtained by the parents). It must clearly justify, for health reasons only, if it is better for the child to attend the preferred school rather than any other school.

Exceptional circumstances must relate to the choice of school; i.e. the circumstances of the child not the economic or social circumstances of the parent.

And Test 2

They would suffer undue hardship if they were unable to attend the school.

Pupils who have an elder brother or sister in attendance at the school and who will still be attending the school when the younger child is admitted;

- 4. Pupils living within the catchment area of the school
- 5. Other pupils arranged in order of priority according to how near their home addresses are to the school. This is measured by the shortest walking route. (Distance will be determined by the use of a computerised GIS system).

Where it is not possible to accommodate all children applying for places within a particular category then the Local Authority will allocate the available places in accordance with the remaining criteria. If for instance, all the catchment area children cannot be accommodated at a school, children who are resident within the catchment area will be arranged in order of priority according to distance i.e. category (6).

If your application is unsuccessful you have the right to make an appeal to an Independent Appeals Panel, details are available from the Local Authority

SCHOOL INFORMATION

Victoria Community School is a co-educational Community School with its own Nursery. We take pupils from 3 to 11 years. The governors are committed to keeping class sizes below 30 in Key Stage 1 and 30 in Key Stage 2.

OFSTED INSPECTION




Our school had a very positive Ofsted Inspection in March 2017. We are graded as a being a good school. Copies of the report and action plans are available from the school office. SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION

Victoria Community School is split across two sites. At Victoria Road we have eleven large teaching areas, an interactive learning centre for Information and Communication Technology, a sensory room, library, gymnasium and large hall. Outside we have a large playground which includes a designated Reception play area, trim trail and sports pitch. We

have a purpose built Nursery on York Street, opposite the main site, which has a lovely garden and outdoor play area. At Victoria Orchard Site there are eight teaching areas, library, large hall, sensory room and a huge outside facility, including a woodland area for outside learning, all which will be used for lots of additional activities to enhance whole school development.

ADDITIONAL STAFFING



At Victoria Community School we have a large team of staff to support our eighteen Class Teachers and additional staffing is provided through funding from the Ethnic Minority Achievement Funding and Pupil Premium Funding. Each class has a team of staff to support your child's learning - usually Class Teacher and Teaching Assistant. Many of our Teaching Assistants are bilingual. They are invaluable in using their bilingual skills for communicating

with parents and for aiding learning in class, for example, with a pupil newly arrived from abroad

EARLY YEARS

STARTING NURSERY AND RECEPTION (FOUNDATION STAGE)



Our Foundation Stage starts when children enter our Nursery and continues to the end of Reception Year.

The Foundation Stage lays secure foundations for future learning. It prepares children for learning in Key Stage 1 and is consistent with the National Curriculum.

"LITTLE VICTORS" NURSERY CLASS



Our Little Victors class is aimed at children who are three and four years old. Children can start our nursery in the term after their third birthday. However, if you are eligible for Think2 funding, your child can start the term they turn three.

The sessions available are either every morning or every afternoon Monday to Friday. We also offer block placements all day on Monday and Tuesdays and Wednesday mornings or Wednesday afternoon and all day Thursday and Friday.

All three year olds are entitled to 15 hours free nursery care. If you are a working family, you may be entitled to 30 hours free childcare- For more information and/or to apply for your voucher code visit Early Education Funding at www.staffordshire.gov.uk/eef.

ADDITIONAL CHARGES

- £2.00 a day for lunchtime supervision
- £4.00 a day for lunchtime supervision with a hot dinner.
- £12.50 for half a day (without lunch cover)
- £25.00 for a full day at nursery with lunch cover

NURSERY TIMES

Children come to morning or afternoon sessions.

Morning Session

- Nursery begins at 8.40 am
- Nursery finishes at 11.40 noon

Afternoon Session

- Nursery begins at 12.20 pm
- Nursery finishes at 3.20 pm



In an emergency please telephone the main school office 247432 who will be happy to pass on a message to the Nursery. Please let us know if someone different will be collecting your child. A password will be required if the person collecting is not known to the class teacher.

HOW WE WORK AND LEARN IN THE FOUNDATION STAGE

The Foundation Stage Curriculum is organised into seven areas of learning and contains **Early Learning Goals** which set out what most children are expected to achieve by the end of Reception Year. These areas are Personal, Social and Emotional Development, Physical Development, Communication and Language, Literacy, Mathematics, Understanding the World and Expressive Arts and Design.

- Every day each learning area is set out to meet a learning objective.
- All nursery learning is done through play and small group sessions.
- In Reception we begin to introduce busy books where we will practise writing and number work.
- You cannot always see what your child has done—you can always ask them.
- All children have a learning journey book with photos and notes in showing what they
 have been doing and progress made.

The role of the staff

- The lead teaching assistant is in charge of the class and planning, but we all work closely as a team.
- We all carry out observations on all children in order to find out about what they can
 do.
- If you have any questions or comments you can speak to any member of the team, all Teaching Assistants will be able to help if the teacher is not available.

HOW DO WE LEARN IN THE EARLY YEARS?

Children's progress is monitored by observation and we use 'Early Years Outcomes' to show how your child has progressed in Early Years. The Early Years classes are arranged in areas where children can learn by playing. These include:

The Creative Area



Your child will like putting an apron on so that they can really enjoy activities such as painting and modelling and exploring sand, water, music and dance. Supporting development within Expressive Arts and Design.

The Knowledge and Understanding of the World Area



Your child will explore a wide range of science equipment and ICT and will do some cooking. Learn about different places and how things have changed. Exploring elements of Understanding the World.

IN THE FOUNDATION STAGE



The Outdoor Area

There is a large paved and grassed area outside Nursery where your child can experience a wide variety of physical play activities. We use this area every day.



Reception has an outdoor classroom which is used all the time to learn, so please make sure your child has a coat and suitable footwear. We do play outside even if its raining.



Language Area

Here there are stories to listen to, language games and the computers to access with activities to support speaking and listening skills.



Maths Area

Your child will learn about shape, colour, sorting, counting and other early mathematical skills.



Reading Corner

Children love to sit and read in the comfy book corner.



Writing Area

Children can experiment with lots of different paper and pencils (writing tools).



Activities

We plan a wide range of activities, usually based on a topic e.g. Shape, Transport or Colour.

SNACK TIME



We have snack time in the Foundation Stage every day. Each child receives a piece of fruit and a carton of milk free of charge. Once your child turns five there is a small charge (£1.00 per week) if they continue to have milk. All children are encouraged to try new foods. We do not force anyone to eat them.

TOYS

We have so many toys for your child to use, please do not send any toys to school with your child.

UNIFORM

Uniform must be worn in Reception but is not necessary in Nursery. The school uniform colour is green.

Your child will not need a P.E. Kit in Nursery. You will be informed when they need one in Reception, usually the Spring Term.

Please see our uniform section in the prospectus for further details.

Make sure your child's name is in every item of clothing.



HEADSTART

During your child's time in the Foundation Stage there will be lots of times when they join in with the main school:

- Assemblies
- Story time with older children
- Sharing Playtime



Remember that parents have the right to choose which school they send their child to—look at several before you decide.

SPEECH AND LANGUAGE CENTRE

Within our school we have a specialist teaching centre for Reception to Year 6 pupils who have speech, language and communication needs. The Centre is based at Victoria Orchard Site.



Most pupils are brought to school by taxi from areas within Staffordshire.




The centre is staffed by both education staff and speech therapy staff and create an environment where language is the primary focus. The centre is an integral part of our school and the pupils are included into mainstream lessons and activities wherever appropriate.





LEARNING AND TEACHING



At our school we believe in the concept of lifelong learning and that our children learn new things every day. We maintain that learning should be a rewarding and enjoyable experience for everyone. We promote quality teaching which equips our children with the skills, knowledge and understanding that they will require in adult life. We believe that appropriate teaching experiences help children to lead happy and rewarding lives.

In most classrooms in our school you will find the morning sessions are usually devoted to the literacy and numeracy hours where the children take part in a range of activities matched to their ability and needs. We believe in giving our pupils equal access to academic, creative and physical activities. A copy of the curriculum plan for your child's age group is available from the Class Teacher.

In the afternoon the children are taught a whole range of lessons including science, history, geography, art, physical education and music which forms part of our Creative Curriculum.

We continually review the curriculum and our approach to teaching and learning. All our staff acknowledge that we all learn in different ways and we need to provide our pupils with a wide range of learning experience and activities matched to their needs and individual learning style.

The organisation for our pupils' teaching and learning is:

MEETING YOUR CHILD'S NEW CLASS TEACHER: INTRODUCTORY MEETINGS



Each September when your child moves to a new class you will be invited to an important meeting to meet your child's new class teacher. You will be able to find out what your child will be learning, how you can support your child in class and have an opportunity to meet other parents.

This may be via a zoom meeting due to current restrictions.

CHILDREN WITH LEARNING DIFFICULTIES



Our Special Needs teacher co-ordinates our school policy, meeting regularly with teachers, parents and pupils to discuss the best ways of meeting each child's needs. All our teachers are skilled in assessing pupils' needs and in preparing work for pupils of all abilities. Individual Education Plans, which are reviewed termly, are provided for those children who need extra support.

GIFTED AND TALENTED CHILDREN



We aim to ensure that children who show particular gifts or talents in various areas of the curriculum are suitably supported, either in school or using outside expertise. During the year we run a number of gifted and talented programmes for small groups of children. These cover a range of subjects including mathematics, literacy, science, art and physical education.

We also work together with local high schools and specialist colleges to support children with particular talents.

HOMEWORK



We expect all our pupils to carry on learning at home and will regularly set homework. It is really important to help your child at home and to encourage them to do whatever homework has been set. It may be sharing a book with you or reading to you or to someone in your family. It is important to complete your child's reading journal each week. You can also help with practising spellings or tables.

Older children are expected to do more work at home to develop their research skills and to encourage independent learning. They may be asked to finish some work or to do some research at home or at the library. We are always ready to discuss how you can help your child at home. You will also be invited to workshops where we will discuss ways of supporting your child. Your child's Class Teacher will be able to give you more details about homework.

PERSONAL, SOCIAL, HEALTH AND ECONMIC EDUCATION

Following local and national guidelines the governors have decided that the school should include a programme of health and sex education as part of our wider Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education policy. This approach is according to the ages and stage of the child's development and follows the requirements of the National Curriculum. Children will learn about living and growing, safety and hygiene, health and fitness.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION



Religious Education (R.E.) is taught throughout the school as a legal requirement of the 1988 Education Reform Act. We follow the Staffordshire agreed syllabus which reflects the teaching and practices of the principle religions represented in Great Britain. "By the end of Key Stage 2, pupils will have explored aspects of two other faiths in addition to Christianity". We teach about Christianity, Islam, Hinduism and other religions.

Religious Education is usually taught as an integral part of our project work. We aim to increase children's knowledge, understanding and appreciation of their own and other religious beliefs and customs. Assemblies are held every day at different times and using different formats. They are largely multi-faith and follow themes. Our assemblies are a time of sharing, togetherness and celebration. You may ask for your child to be withdrawn from religious study or assembly.

Key festivals include:



SCHOOL COUNCIL

The School Council gives our pupils a say in how the school is run. Each class from Year 1 upwards elects members of the class to represent their views at regular meetings. This gives the children the opportunity to say how they feel about everyday life in school. Issues discussed over the last year have included play time, behaviour, school gardens, supporting charities and health, fitness and safety week.

PLAYGROUND ACTIVITIES



We have playground rules to make the playground a happier, safer place for all our children to play. A range of play equipment is provided to give the children more opportunities to take part in a wider range of physical activities in the playground. As an alternative to the hustle and bustle of the playground a quieter, more relaxed atmosphere is provided in the school hall called "Hall Zone" at Victoria Road playtimes where the children can draw and colour or play with construction toys

or board games. Hall zone is not currently taking place due to Covid regulations.

SCHOOL TRIPS AND VISITS

Children learn best when they have real experiences so we plan many exciting visits to support children's learning. You will always get a letter explaining how much the trip will cost, where the class are going and what they will be doing. If you have any concerns or worries please talk to your child's teacher who will be pleased to help.

We have an Educational Visits Co-ordinator who ensures that County guidelines and practices are followed. We always use County approved transport with seat belts and trips are accompanied by several members of staff. We may ask if you would like to go to help! Personal insurance is also available for your child. This is usually paid in September and covers all trips and visits throughout the year.

We try to subsidise the cost of trips as we know how expensive things can be at times but this depends on the school budget. Payments for trips are asked to be made through ParentPay.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

After school clubs usually start after the end of school and finish at 3.45 pm or 4.00 p.m. We have a range of clubs and activities for your child to join. We run football, netball and cricket teams.



Prompt collection after extra curricular activities is appreciated. Failing to collect on time on three occasions will mean your child will no longer be able to attend the club and may be charged for the supervision of your child. Clubs run by Burton Albion finish at 4.15 pm.

If your child attends an after school club on Orchard Site you will be expected to collect them from that site. There may be occasions where you will be required to collect your child from an alternative venue. Please ensure you read letters thoroughly which will clearly outline any change of venue.

HIGH SCHOOL TRANSFER



Each September our Year 6 children transfer to local high schools - eg Abbot Beyne, Paget High School, The de Ferrers Academy, Robert Sutton Catholic Sports College, John Taylor High School and John Taylor Free School. We link closely with the high schools to ensure the children are well prepared and can look forward to the new experiences and challenges with confidence. If you have any concerns regarding your child's transfer to high school please contact the Year 6 teacher. Speech and Language children progress to a range of different schools across the county.

CELEBRATING ACHIEVEMENT



We also have special award assemblies on Fridays to celebrate children's achievement. During the Covid-19 pandemic the Head Teacher has successfully lead these via zoom meetings. Going forward we hope that in the future we will be able come together inviting parents back in to school to celebrate your child's achievements and give you an opportunity to find out more about what your child is learning at school.

Parents Evenings



Every term we hold parents evening to discuss the progress your child is making. We will tell you what your child will be learning and let you know how you can help. We will also discuss the results of any tests that your child has completed. We will also tell you if your child is having any difficulties. During the pandemic these meetings were held via zoom. A decision will be made in September whether they will carry on via zoom or can be held face to face.

Is your child happy?



It is really important let us know if you or your child are worried about anything. Are there are any changes in your home or family life? Does your child enjoy coming to school? Does your child have friends and relations to play with outside school? Children learn best when they are happy, feel confident and feel successful! Changes in your routine or in your home life are likely to have an effect upon your child, sometimes immediately sometimes much later.

Reports



We send home two reports every year; a progress report in February/March to let you know how your child is doing and a full National Curriculum report in July. We also send annual reviews where children have specific learning needs.

BEHAVIOUR POLICY

"We aim for and expect high standards of achievement and behaviour for each individual child".

We believe children behave best when they know what is expected of them. There are over 400 children in school. We expect everyone to behave in a sensible and helpful way with care and consideration for each other. We encourage positive behaviour and monitor unacceptable behaviour. We believe in positive behaviour management - we set codes saying what we want pupils to do rather than rules saying don't do. Please help us to help your child to understand and keep the school codes.



WORKING TOGETHER

A successful and thriving school is a place where parents, teachers and governors work together for the benefit of all the children.

As parents, you play a vital role in the success of your children at School. You can help your child by playing with them, talking and listening with them and reading with them at home and most importantly ensuring children complete their homework.


EVERYONE IS IMPORTANT



SCHOOL UNIFORM

We expect every child to wear our school uniform every day—

Girls:



- White T-shirt, polo shirt or blouse
- **Plain gr**een cardigan, jumper or sweatshirt
- Grey black or green skirt, pinafore or trousers
- Black shoes (no boots or trainers)
- Plain green shalwar kameez (optional)

Boys:



- Plain green jumper, cardigan or sweatshirt
- White T-Shirt, polo shirt or shirt
- Grey or black trousers
- Black shoes (no boots or trainers)

All children will need a labelled drinks bottle which you will need to ensure is washed weekly.

Any caps that are worn during the summer months must be green. The office has legionnaires caps and normal caps for sale for £3.00 each. Please ensure that all uniform is clearly labelled with your child's name as we cannot take responsibility for lost items.

CLOTHES FOR P.E.

Children will need green shorts and a yellow T-shirt, a pair of pumps and a P.E. bag. Tight fitting, black footless leggings may be worn under shorts if preferred. **Jewellery should not be worn during P.E. for safety reasons**.

BOOK BAGS

All children need a book bag to carry their reading book and homework and to bring letters home. Please check their bags regularly. We advise, for the safety of the younger children, that book bags with straps are purchased only for children from Year 2 onwards. We prefer you to purchase book bags where possible, due to lack of space, although there is a school rucksack available to purchase as an alternative.

All uniform and bags can be purchased from My Uniform either by visiting their shop in in Wellington Street, Burton upon Trent or online at www.myuniformltd.co.uk. Please note online orders will incur a delivery charge.

LOST PROPERTY



We encourage children to "take care of things" but please make sure all your child's clothes have their names written on them. Our lost property cupboard is kept in the cloakroom area outside the Year 2 classroom at Victoria Road. If you lose something please tell us as soon as possible so we can have a good look but we cannot take responsibility for lost items. At the Orchard site we expect children to be old enough to look after their possessions.

SCHOOL DINNERS



Children can stay at school for dinner or they can bring a packed lunch with a drink in a carton. Our lunchtime staff take great care of children at lunchtime. They encourage children to try out new dishes but <u>we do not make children eat their dinner</u>. The lunchtime team also organise games and activities during the lunch hour. Teachers are not on duty at dinnertime.

Meals are prepared freshly prepared in both school kitchens and every day there is a choice of menu, including an halal option and vegetarian. The kitchen also use Quorn mince (vegetarian options) in many of their dishes. Children are encouraged to try new foods. A typical menu is as follows:

Main

Golden Fish with Chips Macaroni Cheese Baked potatoes or Paninis with a choice of topping

Seasonal vegetables and potatoes

Dessert

Cook's Homemade Traybake Fresh Fruit Platter Yoghurts

Currently school dinners cost £2.30 per day / £11.50 per week

CASHLESS PAYMENTS

We have an online system called ParentPay for payment of school dinners. You will be given details of how to log onto your account. If you wish to pay by cash, we will issue you with a pay point card which can be used at a number of local shops.

BREAKFAST CLUB

A breakfast club is available each morning from 8.00 a.m. at both sites for <u>all</u> year groups including Nursery. A choice of cereal, toast, yoghurts and fresh orange or apple juice is available. The cost per child is 50p for one food choice plus a drink of juice. There is no charge for children only requiring supervision. Parents must drop their child(ren) in by 8.25 am at Orchard Site or 8.30 am at Victoria Road.

After 8.25 am at Orchard and 8.30 am at Victoria Road all children must come through the school gate.

PLEASE REMEMBER TO CLAIM FOR FREE SCHOOL DINNERS

The School receives extra money for every family who claims free school meals. In April 2021 we received an extra £120,640 in our budget so <u>still do claim</u> please if you are entitled to free school dinners but do not wish to take them, to help us get more money for school.

All Key Stage 1 children are eligible to receive a free school meal due to Government Funding. However you still need to let us know if you are entitled to free school meals by income and make a claim as we receive £1345 per free school meal child.

If you think you may be entitled to free school meals you can complete an application online https://www.staffordshire.gov.uk/Education/Educational-awards-benefits/
FreeSchoolMeals/Apply-online.aspx You will receive an instant reply. If confirmed that you eligible please take a screenshot of the result and email or show to it to a member of the office staff.

YOUR CLASS TEACHER WILL NEED TO KNOW IF ...

- You have changed your mobile or home telephone number.
- You have changed your address.
- Your child has a health problem—or if there has been a health problem.
- Your child takes any medicine regularly.
- Your child is sensitive about something happening at home.
- Your child needs to wear glasses or a hearing aid in School.
- You find head lice in your child's hair.

FIRST AID IN SCHOOL



We have many members of staff qualified in First Aid. If your child has a minor injury we will ensure your child is taken care of in School. If your child has a more serious injury we will contact you so you can go with your child to hospital. We may contact you if your child has a bump on the head to give you the option to take your child home. We are not

allowed to use any creams and lotions in School or give children non-prescribed medicine other than specific drugs for asthma. Many pupils at Victoria need support for asthma. It is really important that those children who have an inhaler with them at all times and should be able to manage it themselves. Parents need to complete a form, available from the school office, for prescribed medicines which need to be taken during the school day.

Please note, in accordance with the law the governors have a duty of care and follow County guidelines. Where there are concerns for the safety and well being of pupils or families, First Response will be contacted for advice and support.

JEWELLERY AND VALUABLES

Children may wear <u>plain</u> ear studs and a watch. Please leave all bangles and necklaces or other items of jewellery safely at home. Please do not let your child bring any mobile phones, toys, and items of jewellery or other valuables to school. Earrings must be removed for all PE lessons.

We cannot accept responsibility for anything that is lost at school.

All our trips and visits must be paid for via the ParentPay system only. You will be issued with a login and password when you join the school. Anyone wishing to pay cash will need to request a barcode letter.

The school kitchen and pupils run break sales every morning on both Victoria Road and Orchard sites offering a selection of snacks and drinks to purchase. Price range from 15p to 40p. Please ensure your child has the correct money with them to make any purchases.

School photographs are taken every year, individual photographs in the Autumn Term and whole class photographs in the Summer Term. Details of the price is included in the photograph packs.

ABSENCES FROM SCHOOL

There have been many important changes in the law concerning pupils attendance at school.

Please note. The law says "All children must come to school every day unless they are ill". These absences are with permission and are authorised. Children can be collected for hospital appointments if you bring the appointment card. For doctors, dentist and optician appointments you are asked to arrange these for after school or during school holidays

We still have too many absences from school. The law says parents whose children miss school without permission can be prosecuted and may be fined. The DfE expects children's attendance to be at least 95%.

Please note that following a new government directive from September 2013 children will not be granted <u>any</u> authorised holiday from school. In January 2018 the local authority changed its protocol in respect of attendance at school. This therefore means that if your child has any absence which is not authorised or is consistently late to school you may be subject to a fixed penalty fine.

Please note Government has stated that the requirement to report attendance has been removed this year
