The information that follows will tell you about our school in more detail, and we hope, if you are interested in becoming our new Headteacher, you will visit to find out more in person.



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

Teaching and Learning at Sefton Park

he common goal of all at Sefton Park is to achieve a genuinely broad curriculum and a solid foundation for children's later life. Some might say that the school is 'a bit different'. This is a school where learning isn't continually set by the clock. It is closer to a journey than a race. The staff strive for high academic standards while providing a broad and balanced curriculum and putting the wellbeing of the children at the heart. High expectations of teaching and learning are achieved at Sefton Park by all staff reflecting on children's learning through adjusting their pedagogy in response to children's needs and interests. Curriculum intent lies within creating a passion for lifelong learning. The three Cs, curiosity, creativity and confidence, weave their way throughout all curriculum areas, providing children with a well-balanced and inspiring platform for learning.

The aim for all children is to become active learners, taking charge of their learning and discovering their talents and interests. As you look around the school, this is reflected in the displays and learning environments; children's work is proudly displayed everywhere.

There is space in all key stages to explore and embed learning through play and exploration. Staff focus on creating a curriculum that aims to equip children with the knowledge, skills and habits of mind which will enable them to thrive in our rapidly changing world, ready and able to take advantage of opportunities and challenges. The teachers plan and implement meaningful, wideranging, challenging and purposeful learning opportunities based on an understanding of how their children learn best.

he school building is Edwardian and L blends seamlessly into the history of the community. The school often takes advantage of the rich history that Bristol and the local area provides; it is indeed a communitydriven school. The local area is often used to stimulate learning. For instance the whole school spent the same day learning about historical local land owner, George Muller, who built a couple of orphanages near to the school which still stand to this day. Each year group learnt about the man and his work at their own level and used age-appropriate skills to investigate his impact - a wonderful opportunity to bring local history to life.

The school engages regularly in school trips to provide real life experiences as stimulation for learning, for example to well-known Bristol landmarks, but also the

local library, opticians and mosque. As a city school, outside space is used carefully to give children every opportunity to enjoy learning opportunities outside as well as in - for example each year group has their own playground, and in the younger year groups children can go freely in and out. Learning about nature and habitats is an imperative at Sefton Park. Forest school takes place in our woodland area, a multipurpose sports area and trim trail are used for physical activity, and Nursery have their own chickens and goats!

t Sefton Park children are encouraged to think for themselves: children's opinions are genuinely valued and they are encouraged to express their views. Children are provided with the skills to express themselves articulately, but they are also guided to respect and value that others may have different perspectives and to be prepared to adjust their views in light of this. Kindness is always encouraged along with caring for others and the world around them. Engagement and positive behaviour is built through involving the children in shaping their experiences and empowering them to make informed choices. Taking risks in learning is a big part of everyday life at Sefton Park.

Excitingly, Sefton Park School will soon be opening a SEN Resource Base for 12 children with Autism who need support with Speech and Language. The resource base will benefit from the expertise that already exists within the school around providing for children with these needs and while it will be located in newly refurbished upstairs rooms, will be integrated into the school as a whole.

Outcomes

The dedicated team at Sefton Park strive for the best outcomes for all children through a creative and broad curriculum. The curriculum is never narrowed or sacrificed for the sake of 'results'. Children at Sefton Park achieve very well. Please see the information

given for our EYFS, KS1 and KS2 outcomes in 2024.

Both the Infant and Junior School were judged by Ofsted to be good schools. The Infant School was inspected by Ofsted in 2020 and was judged to have outstanding Early Years provision - the report highlighted

the positive learning experiences and the excellent beginnings that children are given. The 2023 report for the Junior School highlighted the engaging, exciting and highly effective curriculum. Both reports commented on how the schools put the children at the heart of all they do, whilst striving for high academic standards.

Extra-curricular activities

In addition to 'Premier' after school club which operates on our site, Sefton Park offers a wide variety of extra-curricular activities to children in all years before, during and after school, run by the school and a range of providers to suit different interests. After school, for example, outdoor clubs such as dodgeball, football, netball, Kung-fu, street dance, circus skills, basketball and the Outdoors Project.

Many other clubs have been offered based on children's, staff and parents' interests. Previous examples included Latin club, Japanese club, Lego club, cricket, chess, gymnastics, multi-sports, fencing, drama, board games, mindfulness, yoga, knitting and many more.

A swell as the PE lessons that 'Novus' provides during school hours, our students also have swimming lessons from Year 3, the parents run a Saturday morning football club for all ages and the school takes part in various sports competitions. Children are offered music lessons in Years 2 to 6, there are choirs and all children take part in class performances of various kinds each year. Year 5 & Year 6 both go on a highly enjoyable residential camps!

Our school community

The community of Sefton Park is an important aspect of the school for Sefton Park families. The school's friendly, welcoming and warm atmosphere is created by the children, the staff and the families alike. This alchemy, created within the school, pours out into the playgrounds at the end of the school day at pick up time and out into the streets, roads and parks surrounding the school. Happy Lane, officially named several years ago by the children at Sefton Park, is a pedestrian path running alongside the school grounds and is filled with the bubbling sound of school children, younger siblings and adults, a sound marking the start and end of the school day.

Parents and carers volunteer their time in school to listen to children reading, help take the children swimming each week,

and offer extra help for school trips. Sefton Park families are interested and involved in their children's education and, at termly events when year groups showcase their learning, parents and carers fill the halls to see the children centre stage.

The Sefton Park Parent Teacher Association (PTA) organises a variety of events throughout the school year with the principal aim of bringing the school

community together. These events also help to raise significant funds which go towards enriching elements of the children's schooling experience. The Winter fair and Summer 'Seftival' draw in crowds from beyond the school community itself and can be seen as a celebration of the whole school community and the role the school plays within the local community.

Our community responds



A PARENT: The school is inclusive, creative and offers a nurturing environment for learning. There is an emphasis on well-being and kindness, and although the school delivers excellent academic results the children are never made to feel that this is the only important thing.

A TEACHER: As a school we really hold on to the importance of child-centred learning. We do drive for high academic standards but not at the expense of a broad curriculum or of children's well-being. The Sefton Park vision of everyone being a learner and the way in which we aim to involve and motivate children. We encourage children to think for themselves. The way we build engagement through involving the children in shaping their experiences and empowering them to make informed choices.

A PARENT: The atmosphere and the ethos around allowing (and encouraging) children to explore what it is that they are interested in makes it special. It is important that traditional academic subjects are taught, and taught well (which I believe the school does), but the school's real selling point is that the school values all of the things that children are interested in, not just academic subjects. Kids coming home saying "I just had fun today", when they have done activities that taught them maths, English, teamwork etc, is a perfect environment [for learning]. Teaching the children to think for themselves, and not telling them that there is a definite "right and wrong" answer, is good, develops confidence, and prepares the children really well for secondary school and adulthood. Time is also spent teaching the children about teamwork and interacting with each other - it's very impressive.


A MEMBER OF THE SUPPORT STAFF: What makes Sefton Park special? A SENIOR TEACHER: Sefton Park does stand out. It exists, and has existed for some time, in an educational environment driven by league tables that are in themselves driven by a very narrow curriculum. A situation where schools claim to aim for a broad curriculum but in reality deliver another - non-stop numeracy and literacy. Sefton Park is different. The governors, senior management team and all the staff have worked towards a common goal of a truly broad curriculum and making it the foundation for children's later life that a Primary education should be.



Our wider context

Sefton Park School is situated in an incredibly varied part of the city, on the edge of districts which have their own distinct characters and features. Surrounded by streets of predominantly Victorian and Edwardian houses, it is an area steeped in the history of Bristol - from the Victorians and their buildings and parks, to the memorial to the Second World War 'plane crash in St Andrew's Park, and the derelict WWII battery on Purdown. Pockets of nature can be found nearby with allotments and a city farm within a mile as well as the ancient woodlands of Narroways. Virtually on the school's doorstep is a Scout Hut and a Tennis Club and just a 'cricket ball throw' away is the County Cricket ground. The local high street, Gloucester Road, claims to be the longest high street of



independent shops in the country and the famous Stokes Croft, with its internationally recognised street art, is just down the hill. It's a community of artists and people who like to express themselves; politically aware, environmentally conscious, invested in their local community and with a global outlook. Creativity can be found everywhere: in the

shops selling the works of local artisans, on the walls, on the annual artists' trails and within the homes of local residents. To brighten the darkest months of Winter, households take part in creating a "Window Wanderland" by decorating their street-facing windows for the enjoyment of passers-by. Artwork by children at the Sefton Park will often brighten a winter

street from the window of a local shop as part of this community installation.

The city of Bristol is vibrant, colourful and rich in culture. It is home to some nationally recognised attractions such as Brunel's ship, the SS Great Britain, the science museum 'We the Curious', and MShed which tells the story of Bristol's heritage. All of these are found on the historic floating harbour beneath the iconic Clifton Suspension Bridge. Theatre and live music can be enjoyed in the large playhouses such as the Hippodrome, Bristol Beacon, Bristol Old Vic and Tobacco Factory theatres as well as in the pubs, clubs and halls. Bristol is a city in which the people like to express themselves through their creativity, providing a rich (and educational!) smorgasbord of street art, great food from all over the world, music, theatre, film and festivals.
















Famous connections to this school
