School Uniform

At Royal Liberty we want our students to look smart in their school uniform at all times; not only in school but also travelling to and from school. We feel it is important that students have pride in their school and respect its uniform by wearing it neatly. All uniform can be purchased from Havering Schoolwear.

- · Blazer Black with school badge embroidered onto pocket.
- Trousers Plain, black formal style trousers. Belt, if worn, must be plain black with no decorative buckle.
- Shirt Plain, white collared shirt which is worn tucked into trousers. Vests (if worn) must be plain white and not visible.
- Tie Blue with gold stripe (Years 7 & 8), black with gold stripe (Years 9,10 & 11).

 Jumper - Black V-neck with the school logo.

 Shoes - Plain black leather shoes with no decoration. Black laces only.

· Socks - Plain, dark coloured.

 Overcoats - Plain, suitable for schoolwear with no visible trademark/logo. Black or Navy in colour. No hoodies.

Hats - Outside use only.
 Plain black. No caps.

 Hair - Any hair colouring should be of a 'natural' colour.
 The length should be a grade two minimum on top, side and back and should be without words, patterns or emblems. It is the student's responsibility to ensure their hair is clean and kept in a presentable style. Long hair must be tied back.



The kit below must be brought to school for every PE lesson and is compulsory PE uniform apart from the jogging bottoms.

• T-Shirt - Short sleeve and sky blue with school logo.

· Shorts - Navy with school logo.

Football Socks - Navy long socks.

• Studded boots - Suitable for firm and soft ground.

• Trainers- Sports trainers or astro turf trainers.

· Gumshield.

Shinpads.

 Jogging Bottoms - Navy with silver stripe and school logo.

In addition football and rugby kit can be purchased via the school through Parentpay. This is optional and not a compulsory requirement to take part in these sports.

These guidelines attempt to create an appearance appropriate to school wear. Appropriateness can be disputed; however, in an attempt to ensure consistency, the school's Leadership Team, in consultation with the Pastoral Team, respectfully reserves the right to determine what is appropriate and what is not.

Slogans, patterns or words must not appear in any school uniform or personal appearances. Body piercing or facial jewellery should not be worn.

Parents are advised to consult with the school prior to purchasing any item of uniform or change in personal appearance which could conflict with the Uniform Code.






Curriculum and Assessment

At The Royal Liberty School we regularly review our curriculum provision to ensure that we are giving our students the best possible learning experience. We place importance on subject knowledge but also encourage our students to develop skills in independent learning and working with others. We encourage our students to be reflective, thoughtful learners who develop the confidence to challenge traditional thinking and become creative, enquiring students who can take responsibility for their own learning. Within the curriculum, students are given opportunities to develop their cultural capital, to develop their knowledge of careers and to celebrate equality, diversity and inclusion.

All students follow a broad curriculum. Our Key Stage Three curriculum is for year seven and eight students and our Key Stage Four curriculum is for students in years nine to eleven. A three year Key Stage four affords students opportunities to deepen their knowledge and understanding, improve their recall skills and embed key concepts and skills. It also allows students to explore higher level content which helps them prepare for their post-16 courses. We have increased time to run a flexible curriculum which includes enrichment activities which help develop our students as rounded lifelong learners.

The Key Stage Three curriculum offer consists of:



Social, Moral, Spiritual and Cultural (SMSC) includes provision for Careers Education, Health Education, Sex and Relationship Education (SRE), Personal Development, Citizenship and promoting British Values.

At Key Stage four we expect the majority of students to take the English Baccalaureate; a suite of qualifications consisting of English Language/Literature, maths, science (two sciences), humanities (history or geography) and a modern foreign language. All students have to take a Humanities subject (either Geography or History) as an option; for the majority it is also compulsory to take a language at GCSE.

Curriculum maps are available on the school website to show the sequence of learning in each subject, assessments and other information relevant to our curriculum offer.

We operate an online assessment system called Go4schools. This system allows parents to log on and access all of their son's attainment information. In most subjects students are formally assessed once per half term. Parents will receive three published sets of data throughout the year relating to their progress along with an annual full written report. This allows parents to track their son's progress across the academic year. Students are also able to log onto the system to see their assessment results. This system also records attendance, punctuality, behavioural incidents (both positive and negative) so that parents are fully aware of how their son is performing. A smart phone app is also avaliable to monitor your sons progress via Go4schools.



We have high expectations of all students and set aspirational end of year and end of key stage targets. Go4Schools allows you to track your son's progress against these targets. Student progress is monitored by form tutors, subject teachers and subject specialists, Heads of Year and also by the Senior Leadership Team.



At Royal Liberty, we recognise that home learning is an important element of any student's school life. When used properly, home learning extends the challenge open to the student and ensures that teaching time is used to maximum effect. It also helps students to become independent learners.

All staff ensure that suitable home learning activities are planned and logged on Show My Homework. Both students and their parents/carers can access Show My Homework online or through the smartphone app. Notification of home learning activities and

deadlines can be received on devices such as mobile phones, tablets and via email.

A homelearning timetable is published on the school website.




Special Educational Needs (SEND)

The Royal Liberty School is an inclusive environment where all students are challenged appropriately according to their needs. The SEND department is led by Mrs Larner (SENCO) who co-ordinates the school's overall response to your son's needs by working with a large team of people. These include Learning Support Assistants, led by Ms Lemon (who is also the EAL Specialist) and Learning Mentor Ms Everingham, who provides additional support to students and parents. As a team we also work with a number of outside agencies on a regular basis including Educational Psychologist, School Counsellor, Educational Welfare Officer and CAD 5-19, to name but a few.

Students identified as having a special educational need or disability and who need further intervention are placed on the SEND register so that teaching staff have the correct information in order to best help them in the classroom and around the school. Staff also receive an Individual Education Plan (IEP) about the student, giving them strategies to best support their SEND students. Some students will receive hover support in class and, where necessary, may be removed from lessons for one to one or small group support.

We are able to provide a number of interventions to support SEND students, depending on their individual needs. These include programmes to aid literacy, numeracy, speech and language, social communication, fine motor skills, memory and emotional literacy.

Behaviour and Attendence

All students are expected to maintain high standards of behaviour at all times. This includes on their journey to and from school.

Expectations of students are made clear in the Home School Agreement. Sanctions for poor behaviour are clearly explained to students and are implemented firmly by all staff.

Students are also rewarded for good behaviour, excellent attendance and effort with their work.

We are proud of the caring ethos of the school and the well-ordered learning environment. We have high expectations of student behaviour; we give students clear guidance and support. Boys here know what is expected of them and they work hard to reach these high standards. The school was inspected by Ofsted in 2019 and behaviour was rated as good throughout the school.

At The Royal Liberty School we have high expectations and take your child's attendance very seriously. Students will achieve more with good attendance.

By law, school must record absences and the reason given. You must contact the school as soon as possible (before 9.30am) not only on the first day but every day that follows.

If no reason is provided, then your child will receive an unauthorised mark which will have a negative effect on your child's attendance and progress in school.

Punctuality is essential for children to start the day well. When your child arrives late to school, they may miss the teacher's instructions or introduction to the lesson. Your child may also feel embarrassed at having to enter a classroom late and possibly alone. Students are allowed on site each day from 8.15am and can access the breakfast club if they wish.



Personal and Community Responsibility

Students at Royal Liberty School are encouraged from the beginning of year seven to take on responsibility and to play a positive role in developing our school community.

Each form has a number of positions of responsibility that are elected by other students in the Form. These are a Sports representative and form representative. In addition, year seven students can apply to become a member of the Junior Leadership Team representing their year groups' opinions on a range of whole school matters such as; choosing Jack Petchey winners, providing student voice on school improvement and the curriculum, and contributing to the student noticeboard and students' newsletter.

Members of the Junior Leadership Team have the opportunity to achieve the Specialist Schools and Academies Trust Silver Leadership Award. This is a national award which is recognised by colleges and universities. Being a member of the Junior Leadership Team helps students build their confidence while playing a vital role in the school community.

Students from year seven onwards can become Ambassadors in a variety of subjects such as science, geography, maths, creative arts and MFL. These Ambassadors take on specific responsibilities both within and outside of the school, often delivering outreach work to local primary schools.

Students at the school take part in many charity fundraising events and inter-college competitions. These opportunities enable our students to develop leadership qualities and a sense of responsibility for others; qualities that are so important to the future of our society.

Our ESP (Elite sportsmen programme) is well established and enables talented young sportsmen to develop their leadership skills within a number of settings such as refereeing borough competitions, leading primary lessons and taking a lead within their own P.E lessons.





Students in year 10 can apply to become College Captains. Applicants to be College Captains are short listed by the Senior leadership team and undergo a rigorous interview process before being chosen. College Captains have to be positive role models for younger students and have exceptionally high standards of behaviour, punctuality and attendance. College Captains can apply for the position of Head Boy. The Head Boy and Deputy Head Boy are then selected by presentations to the Senior Leadership Team and the Head of Year Eleven. College Captains have a number of roles and responsibilities across the school and are also given training to support their development as leaders. In previous years, all of our College Captains have achieved the Specialist Schools and Academies Trust Silver Leadership Award.

The role of College Captain is an important and exciting one. During a students time as College Captain, they will be given the opportunity to develop leadership skills and have significant influence on the daily life of the school.

As well as their general responsibilities to fellow students and staff, the Captains will be assigned to one of the more specific roles below:

- Department Captains acting as a student voice representative for the department and assisting the department.
- Communications Captain acting as the main link between the Captains and the school community.
- Equality and Diversity Captain acting as EDI role models and assisting the school to achieve the equality and diversity mark.
- Charity and Fundraising Captain leading on fundraising and charity events throughout the school community.



Subject Ambassadors

At the Royal Liberty school we are proud of the way in which our young men volunteer for positions of responsibility within the school and act as positive role models for younger students.

One of the ways in which students can do this is by applying to become subject ambassadors. Details of some of these roles are below:



The aim of the ESP programme is to help the pupils progress further in their sports by attending after school sessions to help with fitness, diet, lifestyle management, time management and other factors which affect their school and sporting life. This will help them to manage both the commitments of school and their sport so that neither has to suffer and will hopefully lead to success in both. They have worked with the Havering Sport Collective to lead both primary and secondary school competitons.

Elite Sport Programme (ESP)

Throughout the school year, the Science Ambassadors partake in multiple science roadshows, educating both primary school students and members of the public. Through the use of hands-on science experiments and demonstrations, the Ambassadors aim to enthuse the next generation of scientists, as well as promote science within the local community. The highlight of their yearly schedule is Science Week, consisting of over 500 primary school students visiting The Royal Liberty School and experiencing what it is to carry out scientific investigations.



Science Ambassadors



Our Language Ambassadors work to promote the love of learning a new language in all that they do. The ambassadors visit local primary schools to deliver workshops to allow younger students to develop their linguistic skills. Within school the language ambassadors plan activities and competitions for other students, such as form time quizes about different cultures and leading on assemblies about French and Spanish traditions. Being a Language Ambassador helps build self confidence in students while supporting their learning by helping to teach others.

Language Ambassadors

Creative Arts Ambassadors have the opportunity to support and run extra-curricular clubs, outreach programmes with local primary schools, and gallery visits. They support school dramatic and musical productions as well as supporting Art exhibitions by helping to run the events and providing musical interludes. They speak to visitors and guest speakers, and promote the Creative Arts faculty in Open Evening Events. They also regularly meet to discuss the Creative Arts curriculum and complete student voice exercises.





History Ambassadors comprise of students from years 7 and 8, for which all pupils are invited to apply. Chief among their roles is to represent our department in school events as well as through outreach to local primary schools which will allow them to spread their passion for the subject. They will also help plan and deliver inter college competitions - allowing the wider school community to engage with history in theory and practice, making the most of the rich history that our school has.

History Ambassadors

Part of the role of Geography Ambassadors is to represent the department in school events and they have also been instrumental in setting up two Geography clubs. Firstly, they help key stage three students with their home learning and any catch up or help with work they require. They also help to run a film and media club each Thursday after school. The Ambassadors have taken a year nine and ten assembly on Fairtrade and will be creating and running intercollege competitions and humanities higher challenge sessions.

At present, there are ten year eight English Ambassadors. They have a variety of roles within the English department. One is to change displays daily to create a stimulating and engaging learning environment. They also ensure that English classrooms are maintained to a good standard and that we do our bit for the environment by recycling plastic & paper. From September, the English Ambassadors will embark on delivering a reading programme with underachieving younger students. They are true assets to the department!

English Ambassadors

The role of Business Ambassadors is well established in the department, playing a vital role in supporting the Business and Computing department at various events. Ambassadors are required to act as subject representatives at Open Evenings and Year Eight Options Assemblies and contribute valuable insights on teaching approaches and the impact on learning. Computing Ambassadors also participate in delivering the Safer Internet Week campaign to all year groups and assist in running a weekly Code Club for year seven and eight students.



Business and Computer Science Ambassadors



The roles of Maths Ambassadors have included helping run the PiXL maths competition, creating displays and promoting numeracy across the school. They have done this last one in two major ways so far, the first being to help year seven and eight form tutors run their numeracy ninjas task during form time, supporting both the staff and students. The second has been to help create and run a session for local primary schools about circles; giving them the chance to experience a secondary maths lesson.

Careers

At the Royal Liberty School we understand the importance of effective Careers Education and Guidance and hence, from year 7 onwards students are encouraged to think about their futures. Careers education is an important part of our curriculum and forms an integral part of our Citizenship and our Form Time programme.

The school has strong links with the many employers, colleges, sixth forms and universities, in particular the Russell Group universities. We work closely with these institutions to raise the aspirations of all our students. We also have various speakers who come in to talk and give presentations on careers, for the coming year with the need for social distancing still at the forefront there will also be a wide range of virtual experiences for the boys including activities with STEM, Inspire the future, ASK apprenticeships, LikeToBe.org, INVestin. All of these organisations are there to help the students in their choice of career pathway and to reach their full potential.

Impartial and confidential careers guidance is provided to help students make informed choices about their learning for post 16 and further and higher education courses.

All students in year eleven have the opportunity to attend a confidential careers interview with an external provider. Students in all other year groups who are highlighted as needing extra guidance will also be interviewed to ensure we have provided them with early intervention support.

The school's Career's Leader is Mr Benstead. There is a Careers Resource Area in the Head of Year 11 office which has extensive up to date information which students can use to research a variety of career and post 16 options. There is also extensive information on the school website including a range of links to websites offering career information. Students are able to get help with the following:

College or Sixth form Transfer Process

- Advice on course selection for the students ability and future career ideas
- Guidance on completing online and paper based applications
- Guidance on preparing a good personal statement

One to One Careers Interviews

- Guidance on choosing suitable choices for their intended career
- Up to date information on apprenticeships
- Employment and Apprenticeship opportunities available

Employment and Apprenticeship Opportunities

- Help completing job and apprenticeship application forms
- Up to date information on job opportunities
- Help preparing a good CV and covering letter

Year 8 KS4 Options:

Students are fully supported through their options selection process. Form Tutors and the Head of Year are available to discuss suitable KS4 choices which will enable students to move on to further and higher education. Students have an Options and Careers Day in February where they have the opportunity to speak to staff from various educational establishments and employers from different job sectors.

Year 10 Work Related Learning (WRL):

All students in year 10 will receive a programme of WRL activities as part of the school's enrichment week programme in July. The programme includes visits from external providers who will help students with CVs and personal statements, jobs and apprenticeships searches and interview techniques. Students will also learn about employability skills such as team building and problem solving.

Year 11 College/Sixth Form Transfer:

Students are given a great deal of impartial guidance and support with their transfer to post 16 education. The school holds a Post 16 Transfer Evening in October when a representative from Havering Colleges gives a presentation to students and is on hand to answer questions and give advice. We also have a range of colleges and sixth forms who come in and provide students with information on what they offer and their application process and entry criteria. All year 11 students attend a local Raising Participation Age event. Various presentations are held for Year 11 from neighbouring Sixth Form and Colleges.



Challenge

One of the key priorities at Royal Liberty school is to make sure that all students are challenged and especially the more able students in the school. We challenge our students in a number of different ways at the school both inside and outside of the classroom.

In the classroom teaching staff aim to teach all students the skills required to achieve the very best grades in the subject. Teachers will use a variety of different strategies to challenge the most able students and therefore, also challenge all other levels of learners in the classroom. Some of these strategies include:

- · Encouraging and developing students' ability to learn independently.
- · Planning lessons which take account of a variety of learning styles and intelligences.
- · Guiding learners to lead their own learning in the classroom and in home learning.
- Teaching to the top and supporting middle and lower abilities.
- · Giving extension tasks to more able students that specifically target analytical skills.
- · Offering opportunities for independence and self-direction.
- · Encouraging risk taking.
- Using various structures in the classroom to encourage talk between different groups
 of students. This will encourage the more able students to think more deeply about
 their audience for the points that they wish to make.


Outside of the classroom teaching staff and subject areas provide a number activities and programmes that continue to challenge the students but in a different learning environment.



Super Curriculum:

The first cohort of year nine students took part in the Super Curriculum Programme this year. This programme is for the highest achieving students in the year group.

The programme involves students taking on a research project during the Spring Term and then presenting their findings to staff and parents at a presentation evening. Students involved





Extra Curricular Activities:

As a school we provide an extensive extra curricular programme. Extra curricular activities allow subjects to provide an enjoyable but challenging environment outside of the classroom and allow students to extend their knowledge and apply it in a very different environment. Many of our extra curricular clubs also compete against other schools in the borough and further afield.

Subject Ambassador Roles:

Royal liberty school also has an extensive subject ambassador programme. Throughout the school these ambassadors are given the opportunity to develop communicational, leadership and teamwork skills in a number of different events throughout the year. Students are given the opportunity to deliver workshops and event days to local primary schools both in school at the primary schools themselves. They also work alongside secondary school in the borough to deliver secondary borough competitions and also primary school competitions.



Internship Bursaries

InvestIn

In order to give our students the best possible opportunities and the chance to achieve their goals for their working lives after leaving us, we have introduced a programme of internships and bursaries with the company InvestIn. This company provides high quality placements in a range of career settings (which range from Future Doctor to Future Filmmaker) that allow students to truly experience what is involved in career paths that interest them. These placements can be both in person and online.

Our school is gifted an annual income from the Old Libertian's War Memorial Charitable Trust. The expectation is that this money is to be used to enhance the education of our students. As such, we are using part of this money to fully fund student internships through InvestIN.

Each academic year our students will be able to apply for one of the following fully funded programmes:

Year Ten

- Three 5 day live online internship bursaries (targeted at disadvantaged students).
- · Two 5 day in person internship bursaries.
- · Two 5 day live online internship bursaries.

Year Nine

- · Two 5 day in person internship bursaries.
- · Two 5 day live online internship bursaries.

Year Eight

Three weekend live online internship bursaries.

Links with Eton College

Our school are proud participants of the Orwell Award offered by Eton College. This is a scholarship programme that offers fully-funded places for students to complete their A Level studies at one of the world's most prestigious schools.

Since the 2018/19 academic year, we have had students achieving the Orwell Award. Indeed, for the last academic year we had more successful applications than ever before!

As part of our partnership with Eton, four of our Year 10 students are able to attend an annual, fully-funded residential summer school on the College campus. Students taking part in the summer school stay on site for five nights and get a true experience of life at one of the world's most prestigious schools.

In the first instance, students will submit an application to the school, with supporting statements from both a teacher and their head of year. We get a large number of strong applications.

Our contacts at Eton have also made it clear that, as social restrictions continue to ease, we will soon be able to take selected students on tours of the school. This will help enhance any applications they make for the fully-funded places Eton offers in their sixth form.

We support students across all year groups and am always happy to liaise and meet with parents. We believe building the home and school partnership plays a huge role in encouraging a student to reach their full potential.

We provide a daily meet and greet at form time for identified students who may need some reassurance at the start of their day. Students may present with a variety of issues which can seem overwhelming but talking things through can help to alleviate anxieties.

Students who may benefit from either mentoring or counselling are referred to the Learning Mentor by Heads of Year. We liaise with the Home School Support Worker (HSSW) and Attendance officer where we discuss raising attendance.

The school also runs a daily Buddies Club at break and lunch time which is available to years seven to ten. The students can use this time to relax, make friends and socialise. This year we have also been able to support students who find it difficult to get on with others through social groups.
