Humanities at Alsager School

The Humanities faculty comprises of 7 subjects: History, Politics, Geography, RE and Worldviews, Philosophy and Ethics, Criminology and Psychology. There are nineteen members of staff, three of whom are part-time. The Faculty is led by a Curriculum leader and two Deputies.

All pupils follow the National Curriculum in years 7-9 where they receive 3 lessons per fortnight for Geography and History. RE and Worldviews is taught in Years 7-8 with 2 lessons per fortnight. The courses are organised on a modular basis. In Years 10 and 11 the structure of the GCSE options columns ensures that all pupils can study at least one specialist humanities subject, many take the opportunity to study two. All pupils study full course GCSE R.E. at KS4. GCSE results in all subjects are very good. Geography, History, Politics, Philosophy and Ethics, Criminology and Psychology are offered as separate subjects at A level. Student numbers at A-Level are excellent and results in all subjects are very strong.

Staff work closely as a team in the development of courses, the production of schemes of work and assessment items. Regular meetings help to maintain the supportive atmosphere and co-operative approach and provide a forum for discussion of both departmental and whole-school initiatives.

Humanities is housed together in the Elkin building, a modern block of five classrooms and two mobile units, housing an additional two classroom in each as well as 5 additional classrooms in the new Purcell building. All rooms have blackout facilities, interactive white boards, wifi connectivity, projectors and visualisers.

The school has a well-equipped Learning Resource Centre comprising in excess of 50 networked P.C's with internet access. In addition, there are another eight computer rooms and a Language Laboratory. The Elkin building also has a suite of laptop computers that can be booked for use in the classroom.

We follow the AQA Psychology A specification. Pupils cover the compulsory content in Year 12 and in Year 13 optional content currently includes: cognition and development, forensic psychology, and schizophrenia. Psychological approaches and research methods are an integral part of the course and this is embedded throughout the two-year course.

For Criminology, we follow the WJEC Applied Certificate and Diploma in Criminology specification. Pupils complete an internal controlled assessment and an external examination in Year 12 and Year 13, with each of the four units contributing 25% of the whole Diploma. In Unit 1, pupils develop the skills needed to design a campaign for change on an under reported crime. In Unit 2, pupils are examined on criminological theories. In the Unit 3 controlled assessment, pupils are presented with a novel crime





scenario and they are required to apply their knowledge from crime scene to court room, to complete a range of tasks. In Unit 4, pupils are examined on a wide variety of crime and punishment topics.

Geography results at A Level are excellent. Teaching is divided between specialists in Physical and Human Geography. The ability to be able to contribute to the teaching of A level is desirable, specialising in either Human or Physical Geography.

Teachers are conscientious, enthusiastic, innovative and flexible. We demand high standards of the pupils in our care, and we are amply rewarded. We are keen to expand our pupils' experiences outside the classroom - which include local fieldwork studies, fieldwork opportunities at Chester Zoo, the Peak District, Manchester, Anglesey and enrichment trips to Italy and Iceland. We also organise attendance at conferences and invite in outside speakers.

New staff receive a comprehensive induction programme into the school as a whole and into the faculty, along with being allocated a dedicated mentor.
