From modest beginnings as "one free school house" for "ten poor children", Parmiter's school grew to become a thriving boys' grammar school, with a proud reputation as "the Eton of the East End."

In 1977, the school relocated to Hertfordshire and in the process became a co-educational school whilst retaining its strong links to Bethnal Green and its tradition of providing educational excellence.

The school receives the financial support of the Parmiter's Foundation Charity whose resources are dedicated to the enhancement of educational provision for our students in the spirit of Thomas Parmiter's bequest.
