### **Humanities Faculty**

The faculty has the following aims it wishes to achieve:

- 1. To foster an appreciation of people and the world they have created past, present and future.
- 2. To develop communication and intellectual skills.
- 3. To encourage pupils to take responsibility for their own learning.
- 4. To develop an awareness of the environment and how we must respect it.
- 5. To encourage an awareness that we live in a multi-cultural world and that each individual has the right to equal opportunities to live a happy, successful life.

The teaching staff currently consists of 14 - 10 full-time, 2 part-time and 2 assistant heads. The subject areas which come under the responsibility of the Head of Faculty are:

Geography & History KS3, GCSE and AS/A-Level

Psychology AS/A-Level Sociology AS/A-Level Government & Politics AS/A-Level Criminology Level 3

The Humanities accommodation consists of 11 classrooms. Resources are stored separately for the respective subjects. There is also an ICT suite with 10 PCs. We have access to the school's networked computer facilities, including two banks of portable laptops and two banks of iPads, which are stored in our area. There is also a library of teaching materials available on the school system, using Stream and ClickView.

Students are taught in mixed-ability groups at KS3. In the upper school, most students take either Geography or History and are taught in mixed ability groups for each subject. Many students currently study both subjects, which is a reflection of their continued popularity. A variety of teaching strategies are employed, particularly those based on active learning. The faculty teaches using differentiated schemes of work, fully subscribing to the principles of Assessment for Learning.

The Humanities results at both GCSE and A Level are strong. In 2019, 38% of History students and 30% of Geography students achieved 9-7 grades. 23% of A Level Humanities students achieved A\*/A grades.

At Sheldon we believe that there are many obvious links between all of the Humanities subjects in terms of philosophy, with human experience at the centre of our studies. The construction of secure knowledge opens the opportunity to apply this experience to a range of contexts and helps our students understand their place in communities at different scales.

By acting as a single unit, the faculty can give its component subjects a powerful voice in forums to discuss whole-school issues and more efficient administration and staffing is made possible. Common policies are agreed on a range of issues and the faculty meets regularly to discuss and share ideas. In particular, the faculty has a common system of assessment and recording, which aims to inform pupils, parents and teaching staff and greatly assist the monitoring of an individual student's progress and the process of setting. Consumable resources are shared and many of the team teach both Geography and History in the lower school, though most of a member of staff's teaching commitment will usually be in their main specialist area.

Whilst the staff work together as a single unit, Geography, History, Psychology, Government and Politics, Sociology and Criminology enjoy a considerable degree of individual integrity, retaining their autonomy. The teachers of each subject meet on a regular basis and operate as individual teams within the faculty structure.

The course is well resourced, with four teachers of criminology and three of psychology. Students have access to textbooks in school for both courses. Teachers also have access to a variety of A-Level texts, which support our syllabus, and we subscribe to "Psychology Review". There are extensive interactive computer-based resources online for staff and students.

KS3 Humanities includes teaching of both Geography and History as separate subjects. Topics in Geography include: World Journey; Great Populations and Ocean Plastics. Topics in History include Medieval Britain, Tudors, the English Civil war and 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries including the world wars.
