Dear Applicant,

Thank you very much for considering making an application to Caistor Grammar School.

We are a small school with an outstanding record of academic achievement and support for our students. We run an enviable extra-curricular programme, which makes a large contribution to the ethos of the School.

We are regularly in the top three highest performing schools in Lincolnshire for A level and GCSE outcomes. Our Progress 8 score of 0.68 (2024) placed us in the top 16% of schools nationally. We live our motto 'Ever to Excel'. We were named East Midlands State Secondary School of the Year for 2025, 2021 and 2018, and East Midlands State Secondary School of Decade in 2020, by The Sunday Times.

We are based in the heart of Caistor, a market town on the edge of the Lincolnshire Wolds. Lincoln is 24 miles to the south and Grimsby 12 miles to the east. To the north, over the Humber Bridge, Hull is about 30 minutes from here. To the East you can enjoy the delights of the coast.

The School is a special, unique place. All staff, teaching and non teaching, work hard to ensure that our students receive the best education possible. We number approximately 700 students, including 170 in the Sixth Form. We are also proud to be a single academy trust with a very supportive parental and trustee body. We work with other primary and secondary schools in our area.

We are an inclusive school, drawing our students from the upper 25% of the ability range. Our sixth form students study three or four A-levels and nearly all go on to either employment, apprenticeships and higher education, including Oxbridge and Russell Group universities. Our students are well motivated and, to quote our last inspection, 'relish their learning.' The atmosphere of the School is friendly, purposeful and inclusive. Colleagues are encouraged to develop their own skills and abilities in a supportive environment. Making an extra-curricular contribution is considered vital.

The School was founded in 1631 and the original school building is still in use. Most of our work, however, is done in buildings which were substantially remodeled and extended in the new millennium. We have recently invested in two new buildings – Grove Court which is home to the MFL department and The Newbolt Centre, a multi purpose hall used mainly for assemblies, exams, performing arts and PE activities. In the last few years we have also up graded our 3G pitch and our dining room was expanded and remodeled in 2019.

The Design and Technology Department

The Design and Technology Department at Caistor Grammar School is based in the Technology Block with a multimaterial workshop, a flexible design/electronics/light manufacturing/IT room and access to two further IT rooms. With two full time teachers of D&T and the invaluable support of a technician, they work collectively as a team to cover all material areas and support the work of our students.

At KS3 we provide all students with a broad Design & Technology experience covering elements of CADCAM, electronics, mechanisms, resistant materials and graphics, to design and manufacture high quality outcomes. We aim to develop an understanding of how materials, manufacturing processes and technologies work, where students take on increasingly challenging design opportunities as they progress through the school. Students also learn about Food Technology in KS3.



We make extensive use of 2D and 3D Computer Aided Design software (2D Design and Inventor) and use these to make effective use of our Computer Aided Manufacturing facilities throughout the KS3, 4 and 5 curriculums.

At KS4 there are two teaching groups in each year, 10 and 11, following Edexcel's 9-1 GCSE D&T Specification, with a focus on Timbers.

At A-Level we follow the Edexcel Product Design Specification with teaching groups of six in Year 12 and Year 13. In 2024 we introduced the Gold Crest Engineering Club for Sixth Form students and in September 2025 we are offering BTec Engineering to students entering Year 12.

We are proud of the extensive level of support available to all our students including lunchtime and after school workshops when the need arises. We enjoy and value very positive relationships with our students which makes this a wonderful teaching and learning environment.

The D&T examination results have consistently been some of the very best in this high achieving school and we are proud of the work and outcomes achieved by the students.

At all key stages of the school, we like to encourage creativity and strive for quality. This includes detailed design thinking and the development of concepts into high quality prototypes. To achieve this standard, we have a comprehensive volume of equipment and machinery, including items such as 3D printers, a laser cutter, as well as traditional machinery, such as use of a metal lathe and mill.

Industrial links help us to enrich and contextualise our school-based curriculum. We compete in the RAF Project X competition annually.

As you can see, we are a broad and exciting place to work, for the right candidate who embraces working with students to enable fantastic progression and supporting them in achieving the results they deserve.
