Dear valued Parents, Carers, and members of the community,

Welcome to the 18th edition of the TCS Tribune. This is our termly newsletter dedicated to sharing the activities of the students and staff in our wonderful school with our wider community.

It has been a busy term as usual, with our students and staff involved in lots of exciting learning and activity.

We were finally able to get the Berlin trip off the ground after interruptions for Covid and rescheduling due to substantial flight-cost increases. You can read about the trip in this edition. It certainly looks like the students got a lot of out of it and we are so grateful to our wonderful staff who volunteer to organise such trips and volunteer to supervise children on their non-working days, evenings and weekends. Without them, these opportunities could not exist.

We have had other day and evening trips out of school. More than 70 Year 11 students attended the New Theatre in Oxford for "Poetry Live!" and our Drama students went to the Fortune Theatre to attend the famous show, "The Woman in Black." These trips provide excellent cultural education for our students and bring alive their learning in Drama and English.

We particularly enjoyed the Dance Showcase where the GCSE Dance students performed their choreography examination pieces to an invited audience. The photos are excellent and a sample are included in this edition. Performance is a key part of GCSE Dance, Music and Drama and we are grateful for your support in attending these to watch your children perform.

We have hosted two information evenings for parents and carers, these being our virtual SEND information evening and our virtual online safety evening. We continue to hold many of these events virtually because parents and carers tell us that this helps them to attend if they have work commitments or difficulties in coming to school for a presentation. It also means that the recordings of these evenings can be stored on the website for anyone to access if they need to.

Our PTFA (Parent, Teacher and Friends Association) has been gaining momentum. The PTFA are a registered charity and help to raise funds for the equipment and facilities at the school. Recent purchases include benches, specialist science equipment and specialist design technology equipment, such as our laser cutter. All these items provide benefit for all children and help to enhance the learning experience. We are also very excited to announce that our gym refurbishment is complete. We now have the latest equipment waiting to help you achieve your fitness and health goals. 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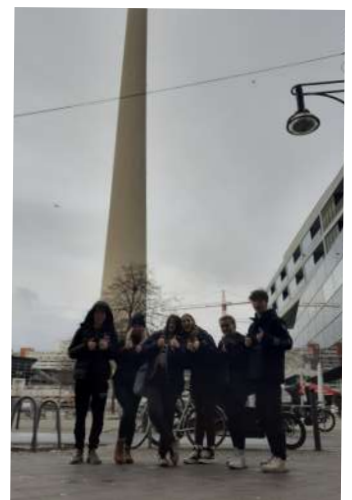
Berlin Trip 2023

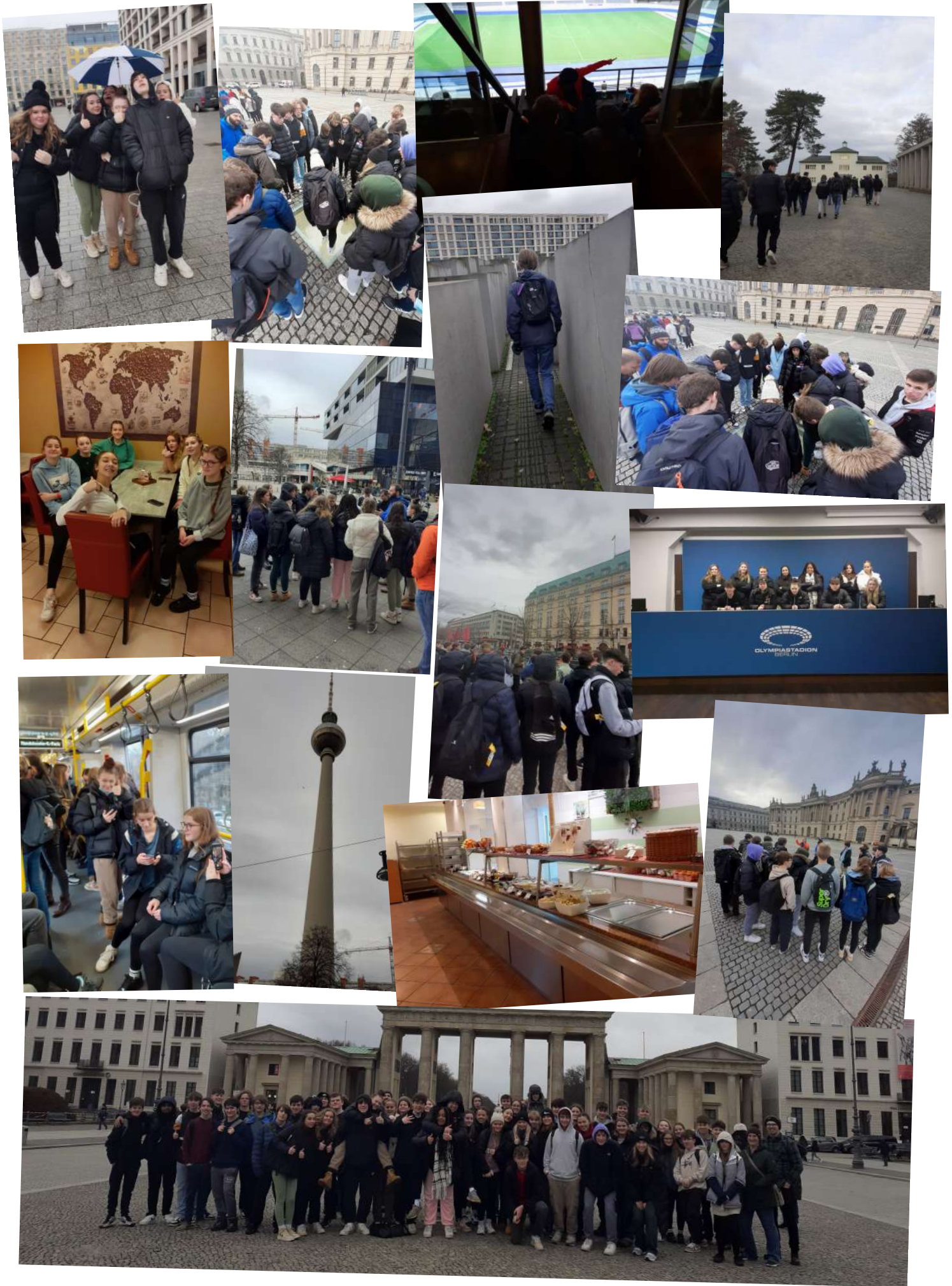
Testbourne students recently travelled to Berlin on a school trip to study German history from 1919 to 1945. The Olympic Stadium was one of the first places they visited. They learned that the building was built for the 1936 Olympics and, other than hosting the games, it was used to showcase Nazi Germany's power and propaganda. They also visited the Reichstag, the German Parliament building. They learned that this was where the Enabling Act was passed, giving Hitler the power to rule by decree. The glass dome symbolizes transparency and democracy, and the rebuilt version represents the reunification of Germany.



The students also visited the site of the Nazi book burning, where the suppression of intellectual freedom was symbolized. It has now been turned into a memorial, which serves as a reminder of the importance of preserving intellectual freedom and resisting censorship. Shortly after, they visited the Sachsenhausen concentration camp (which was another place that left a profound impact on them). It was there that thousands of people were imprisoned, tortured, and killed during the Nazi regime. The camp has been preserved as a memorial to the victims, and visitors can learn about the atrocities that took place.

Finally, the Memorial to the Holocaust was a somber and reflective experience for the students. The memorial consists of 2,711 concrete blocks representing the 6 million Jews killed during the Holocaust. These historical sites serve as a reminder of the dangers of extremism, the importance of democracy and the need to preserve human rights and intellectual freedom. The students felt privileged to have had this opportunity, and they hope that these sites will continue to be preserved as a reminder of the past and a guide for the future.





Online Safety Evening

On Tuesday, March 7th, Dr. Hall, our Senior Designated Safeguarding Lead, provided an Online Safety Information Evening with the objective of educating parents and caregivers about the various online threats that are prevalent today, while also providing guidance on managing precarious online scenarios.



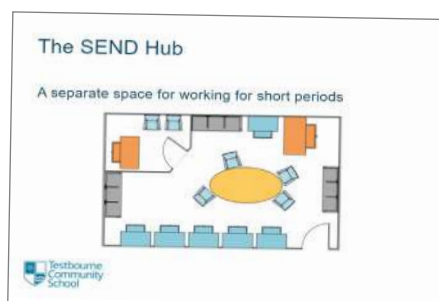
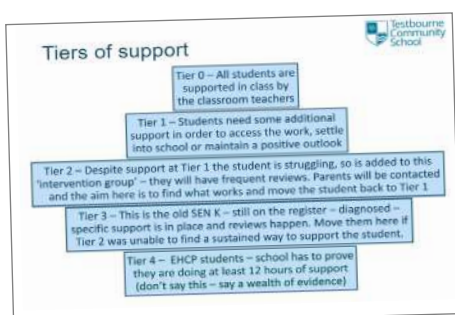
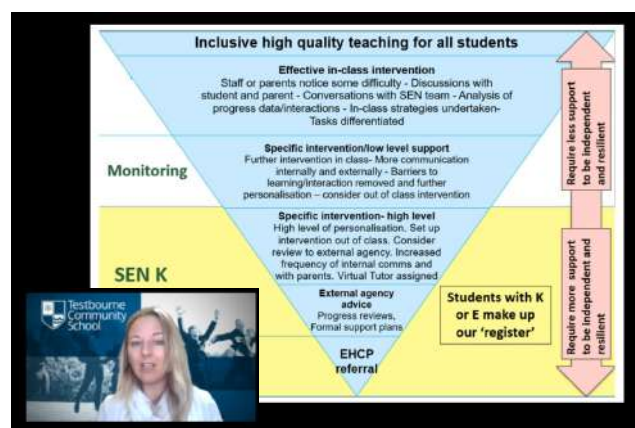
The event covered the content below:

- Knowing where the potential risks may lie: the 4 Cs of Content, Contact, Conduct and Commerce.
- Understanding the potential risks around social media applications.
- Understanding the law – particularly in relation to sharing of images, cyberbullying and related online behaviour.
- Looking at the potential risks that technology may have – phones, tablets, laptops, smart speakers, and games consoles etc.
- Advice on how to talk to your child about online safety – in general or if you are concerned about what they are doing.
- Signposting resources that are available from experts in online safety.
- What to do if you are worried that your child is at risk of harm.

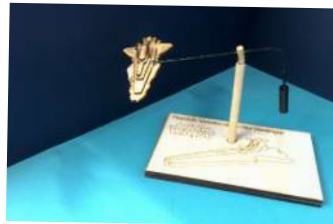
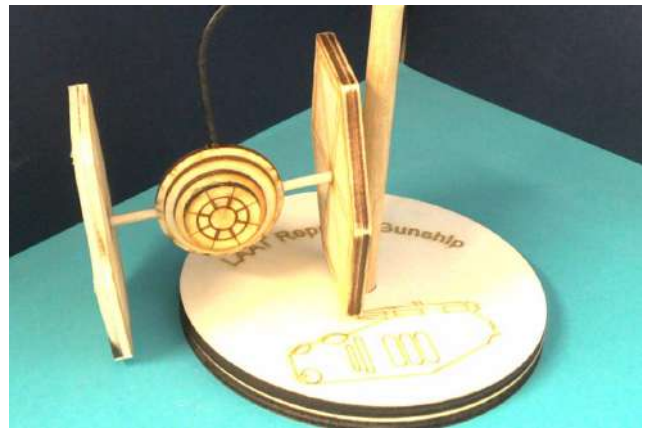

STEM

STEM provision at Testbourne has been continuing to develop and evolve over this year. We now offer a STEM Club, which runs every Thursday after school; participating students have been producing solutions to a range of STEM challenges. The STEM site on SharePoint has now been updated so it is even easier to find out about how Testbourne has been developing its STEM offer. The site also incorporates a section on STEM news, where students can find out about what new features and events are happening locally as well as nationally and globally. Other STEM opportunities are also featured, enabling students to enter a range of competitions and to develop their STEM and creative skills well as encouraging them to consider innovative solutions. News from the Library

We have had a busy term in the library, starting with a visit from local author Jo Clarke to our TCS book club. Mrs Clarke spoke to our students about her newly published book: *Libby and the Highland Heist*, sharing the ups and downs of her writing journey. She gave students advice and encouragement to craft their own heist stories, inspiring them to create imaginative scenarios along with providing helpful hints for how to make a successful mystery story work. We are immensely grateful to Mrs Clarke for giving up her time to visit us and helping to enrich our students' literary environment.



We also had a virtual author visit from the writer of the ever popular *Murder Most Unladylike* series, Robin Stevens. This was a pre-recorded interview that she did for the Hampshire School Library Service, and Robin answered questions that schools had sent in advance, including one from TCS. We are fortunate to have copies of all the *Murder Most Unladylike* books in the library, including a copy of her newly published book, *The Ministry of Unladylike Activity*, for students to borrow.



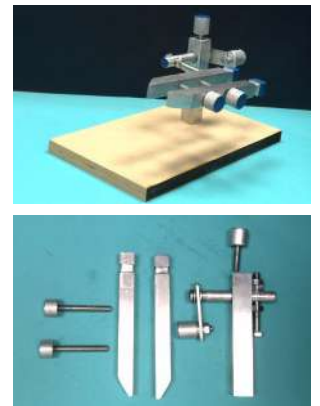
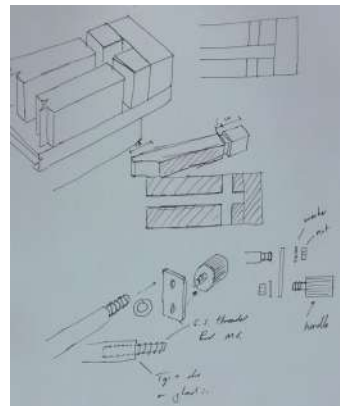
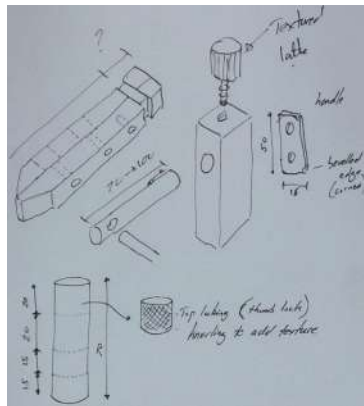
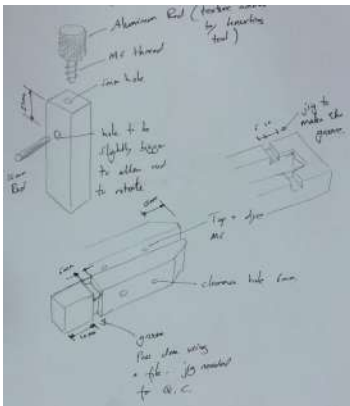
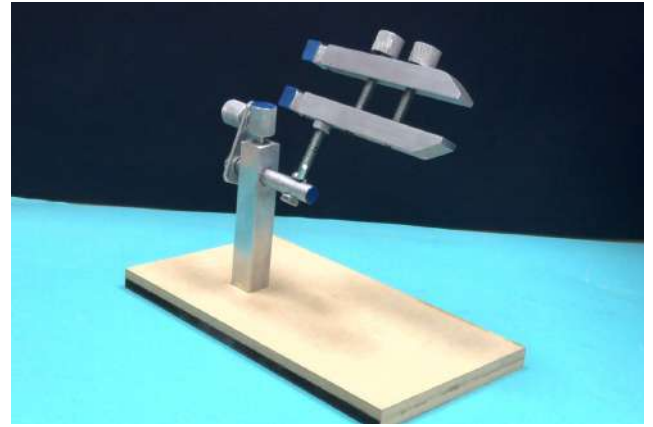
World Book Day was celebrated in March, with staff dressing up with book related accessories and a scavenger hunt around school for students to take part in. They had to find pictures of book characters and fill in an answer grid to work out an anagram of a book related sentence. It was quite tricky, but plenty of students successfully completed it to win a small prize and recognition points. We ran an illustration competition where students were asked to recreate a picture from their favourite book or illustrator, or to redesign the front cover of a book of their choice. There were some strong entries, with two winners, Jasmine and Evie, both Year 8, and two runners up, Alyssa in Year 11 and Hannah in Year 9.



Don't forget that the Sora app is available for ebooks, audio books and magazines and is accessible throughout the Easter holiday. If you are spring cleaning and come across any "lost" library books in your child's bedroom, please ensure that they are returned to school as soon as possible. There are currently a huge number of overdue books that are waiting to be read by other students.

Engineering Technical Award

Engineering Technical Award Students in Year 10 have been manufacturing their Unit 1 practical piece out of aluminium and steel. The product is a small hobby clamp which can hold a variety of small objects but will also tilt and lock to any desired position. Students must manufacture all parts and use a wide variety of practical techniques including use of tap and die, filing, drilling, cutting, and using a lathe, as well as measuring and marking using a wide variety of hand tools. The course enables students to produce very high-quality finished products as well as design and plan how they will realise the result.



MFL Revision Conferences

On Friday 24th March, all Year 11 Modern Foreign Languages students were invited to masterclass conferences.

These conferences were an opportunity for our Spanish students to have a masterclass with our new Head of Department, Miss Matthews, and our French students to have a masterclass with Miss Norris, who is sadly relocating at Easter.

The conferences focused on the four key skills of speaking, listening, reading and writing. Pupils discussed questions from the recent mock exams and were provided with a range of revision tools and tips to help them with exam skills such as deciphering questions, identifying tenses, improving accuracy and clarity and developing and extending ideas.

Both Miss Matthews and Miss Norris were delighted to see pupils so engaged and showing real dedication and diligence in their individual sessions. Pupils found the oral exam practice to be most beneficial given that the speaking exams commence in less than a month. Pupils left feeling motivated and inspired, and with plenty of resources to aid their revision in the run up to the exams.

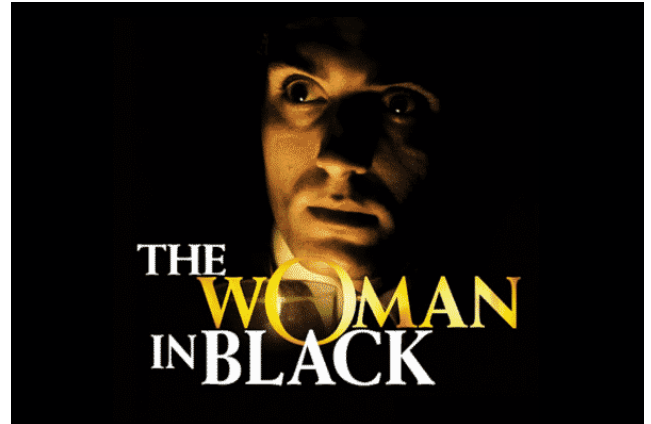

The Woman in Black Drama Trip

Recently, a group of TCS Drama students had the opportunity to visit the Fortune Theatre, London and attend a performance of the famous stage show “The Woman in Black”. The excursion was not only enjoyable, but also provided an educational experience for the students... and it was very scary!!

“The Woman in Black” is a compelling theatrical piece, based on the novel by Susan Hill. It is known for its intricate plot, suspenseful atmosphere, and powerful performances. Watching the play allowed the students to experience a different art form, one that relies on storytelling, stagecraft, and the collective imagination of the audience. The production also gave them an insight into the world of theatre and the complexities involved in putting on a successful show.

Poetry Live!

‘Poetry Live!’ is a touring study conference arranged in concert with the exam boards. Authors of some of the set poetry texts perform readings of their work, with the aim of bringing the poems alive off the page and helping to demystify modern poetry for students. This year, Testbourne students were offered the chance to join nearly a thousand other pupils at the conference in Oxford, as outlined below by Charlotte Vickers, Year 11 TCS student:



At the end of February, Year 11 students visited the New Theatre in Oxford. We were lucky enough to watch poets such as Poet Laureate Simon Armitage, John Agard and Imtiaz Dharker, who performed many interesting poems, which were extremely useful as part of our GCSE revision. They also introduced us to new poems we had not heard before and taught us about the context and connection they felt to their poetry. There were talks from GCSE examiners, who explained common misconceptions and mistakes that many students make, and how to improve our grades. The day was a very valuable and enjoyable day, and we came home with a booklet full of annotated poems, which will be brilliant to revise from and look back on.

Lego Club

Students at Testbourne Community School are getting a chance to exercise their creativity through a unique after-school programme - Lego Club. The club, which meets once a week, has been running for the past month and has proved to be a popular way for students to unwind and socialize. The Lego Club is organised by Mrs. Sykes, who has recently completed her Lego Therapy course and has been instrumental in bringing the programme to the school. The benefits of the club go beyond just having fun with Lego; creative play is essential for developing problem-solving skills, spatial reasoning, and critical thinking, and it's a great way for students to express themselves. Each week, students gather in a classroom that is transformed into a Lego wonderland, with boxes and boxes of colourful bricks and accessories. The students are free to create whatever they want, whether it's a miniature city, a spaceship or a sculpture of their favourite animal.



Mrs Sykes has recently organised for a Lego Play Specialist, Leonora, to spend time with the Lego Clubbers; Leonora very kindly donated a huge box of brand-new Lego which came hot off the production line from the Lego factory in Denmark! Students can sign up to attend the club by visiting Mrs Sykes in The Hub. They are always happy to welcome new members and see what amazing creations they make each week!



Bass Guitar for Jasmine

It was an exciting day in the music department as we took delivery of Jasmine's new bass guitar. This has been purchased with a full grant from the Michael Hurd Fund for Young Musicians. Rugby

With over 20 students turning up regularly to training, we have come a long way this term and have played several matches and tournaments in this time.
