Thank you for expressing an interest in the above post. We are seeking to appoint an outstanding teacher to teach Science, and play a key role in delivery of various aspects of our Science offer at Key Stages 3, 4 and 5.

About the School

Sheringham High School became an Academy in 2011 and is situated on the North Norfolk coast, forty or so minutes from Norwich. Until September 2021, Sheringham High was the central high school in the North Norfolk Academy Trust which has now merged with Synergy MAT.

We are a popular School that caters for over 700 students aged from 11 to 18 who live in Sheringham, Holt and the many surrounding villages. The School occupies a wonderful campus set in its own spacious playing fields with views of the sea.

Visitors comment on the very positive relationships between staff and students, and recognise the focus on learning in a caring and supportive environment. We provide a rich extra-curricular programme that includes a range of artistic, social, technological, literary, linguistic, sporting, dramatic, STEM and musical activities which the appointee should be looking to develop.

Our best ambassadors are our students and we warmly welcome potential applicants to visit the School and see it in action.

Examination results at GCE and GCSE consistently put Sheringham in the top tier of Norfolk schools and, once again, 2021 successes were many under challenging circumstances.

Significantly, the School's EBACC percentages are always much higher than national averages year on year and we are committed to a broad and balanced curriculum built on this EBACC foundation which forms the basis of a strong sixth form transition.

Ofsted

In October 2017 the School was inspected by Ofsted and judged 'good'.

Ofsted stated, 'The above-average results achieved by pupils in Year 11 in 2016 improved further in 2017 to well above average. A higher-than-average proportion of pupils met national expectations in English and mathematics. The proportion of pupils achieving the English Baccalaureate was well above average. Furthermore, the better-than-average progress made by pupils throughout key stages 3 and 4 last year improved further in 2017. This year, on average, pupils achieved over half a grade higher than others nationally.'

Trustees, governors and staff are not complacent. We continue to work very hard to be an even better school. When we are next inspected we are confident that Ofsted will recognise the progress we continue to make and results that are well above Norfolk and national averages.

Why Sheringham?

I'm confident that you would find the school a most enjoyable and rewarding place to work. The colleague appointed to the post will be joining the school at a very exciting, if unusual, time. Furthermore, I know that the support given to a new colleague joining the School will be first rate.
